PSSF Making a Difference

Being a grandparent is supposed to bring joy, not pain. But Liz, a 70-year-old grandmother of four young boys, found herself overwhelmed caring for the active children when her daughter was sent to prison – pregnant with a fifth child. Stress, money worries and the challenges of raising four kids, ages 2-10, in a very different world began to take their toll on Liz. She was at the point of considering giving them up to state foster care and contacted DECS.

A DFCS caseworker referred Liz to a PSSF program providing grandparent support services. Liz began attending support groups and was a "regular" at every function and class. She found employment to meet the financial challenges of raising four little ones and the family was more stable. Through the experience, as hard as it was, she found a confidence she didn't know she possessed.

Amazingly, Liz also began advocating at the State Capitol for grandparent assistance and power of attorney rights to care for minor grandchildren. When the fifth greatgrandson was born, she wasn't able to take him at that time, and he went into care. But within a few years, Liz was able to bring him into her home.


Today, Liz and the boys are thriving and she is still working. The oldest grandson started college this year. Of the four remaining boys, the second is on target to graduate, with honors, in 2013. Her family is a testament to the determination of one committed grandmother.

58% high school education or less


51% employed full- and/or part-time **61%** income less than \$20,000



50% Children remained safely in their homes

 21% Children were reunified with their families
 7% Children achieved permanency through adoption or legal guardianship

2% Youth emancipated from Foster Care


Georgia's Promoting Safe and Stable Families program has steadily built a network of community-based organizations reflecting the state's commitment to ensuring that families have access to the highest quality services and resources needed to help children and youth grow into healthy, contributing members of our society. PSSF is one of the few sources of federal funds directed toward the *prevention* of issues that bring families into the child welfare system.

PSSF Program Areas


PSSF funds provide services to at-risk families in the areas of:

- Family Support to prevent child abuse and neglect among families at risk through the provision of supportive family services
- **Family Preservation** to assure children's safety within the home and preserve intact families in which children have been abused or neglected when the family's needs can be addressed effectively
- Time-Limited Reunification to address the needs of families whose children have been placed in foster care so that reunification may occur in a safe and timely manner
- Adoption Promotion/Post-Permanency Support to provide foster and adoptive families support services so that they can make a lifelong commitment to their children


Service Allocation
